Civil Society and Think Tank Forum 2024: A Key Gathering for Regional Cooperation

From October 9-11, The Balkan Forum joined 115 civil society representatives at the Civil Society and Think Tank Forum 2024, organized by the Aspen Institute and the South East Europe Institute. The event featured a series of impactful activities, including a conference opened by Dr. Anna Lührmann, Germany's Minister of State for Europe and Climate, with further contributions from Special Representative Manuel Sarrazin, Ambassador René Troccaz, and six ministers from the Western Balkans.

One of the forum's highlights was a workshop titled "Enabling Spaces for Civil Society," which fostered high-level exchanges between decision-makers and civil society representatives. Additionally, participants presented a comprehensive mapping study, "10 Years of the Berlin Process," to leaders of the Western Balkans, emphasizing the decade-long journey and progress made under the initiative.

The 2024 Berlin Process Summit focused on key regional milestones, including the advancement of CEFTA agreements, the release of a new Common Regional Market Plan, and the establishment of a fifth regional mobility agreement. Further supporting regional cooperation, Kosovo announced the abolition of its visa regime for Bosnian and Herzegovinian citizens, effective January 1, 2025.

This event provided a valuable platform for networking, where representatives could connect with like-minded individuals and explore new avenues for future collaboration.



The Fast Forward project is moving forward, and we're excited to announce the start of its youth exchange phase! After the first exchange in Sarajevo, Bosnia and Herzegovina, we've now opened the call for applications for the second Youth Exchange, set to take place in Struga, North Macedonia, from December 1–6.

This exchange is a unique chance for young people across the region to come together, share experiences, and develop skills to advance a sustainable, green future.

It is being developed in partnership with six organizations: Build Green Group and Albanian Skills from Albania, BRAVO from Bosnia and Herzegovina, Eco-Logic from North Macedonia, The Balkan Forum from Kosovo, and Brigaid EU Project from Spain.

Regional Engagement



From October 21–23, our Research Officer, Samir Beharić participated in the European Fund for the Balkans (EFB) conference, titled "Failure of policy – failure of process – what next?" As part of the conference, our Samir moderated the panel "Bosnia and Herzegovina – Back to Square One? How to End Stagnation?" with esteemed panelists, including Damir Kapidžić (University of Sarajevo), Ivana Korajlić (Transparency International BiH), Adi Ćerimagić (European Stability Initiative), and Lejla Kusturica (Foundation ACT). The discussion delved into Bosnia's ongoing challenges—from political deadlock to environmental threats—highlighting the importance of EFB's continued support.

On October 29-30, Samir attended a seminar in Skopje on advocating for youth work in Eastern and South-East Europe, organized by the Council of Europe – European Union Youth Partnership. As a follow-up to previous regional seminars, this event gathered experts to discuss the conditions and challenges surrounding youth work in the region. He presented a study on youth brain drain, contributing to a critical dialogue about the future of youth engagement and the urgent need for solutions to retain young talent.
